take a way of life and call it anything you want, but that no matter what, you


cannot take away the *excitement* that defines life at NNU.








breaking ground

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
Welcome Week


working together







Blood and Gift Drive


making a difference






pure fun




Regardless of the verdict, the play created an enjoyable and interesting activity for the weekend. It was a different play each night, depending on who made the jury.





in the spotlight


With pounding bass and screaming fans, the roof of Montgomery Fieldhouse Gym rocked with the sound of Audio Adrenaline on March 22.








shower of vocal brilliance



Members of the NNU student body sacrificed their Saturday morning sleep time for a chance to make a difference in the Nampa community during the spring R.U.S.H. event.

















"It's a fascinating new opportunity for students to explore and it should develop into a much broader major in the very near future," said Art Professor Ty Clutter. With new technology available and a field that was creating possibilities in so many new areas, the Art Department hoped to provide an adequate foundation for the students choosing to pursue careers in the graphic arts field.




preparing for the future

For fifteen senior Elementary Education majors, the road to graduation was not one without struggles, lessons, and hours of valuable experience. In a new education program called Professional Development School, or PDS, seniors spent hours logging in time in the classrooms of local elementary schools in an effort to take the skills gained in their previous years of classes to the board.


Rather than spending their last year on campus in classes and chapels, these students took on a much bigger task. In a program completely devoted to giving prospective teachers the experience needed to successfully run their own classrooms the following year, students from NNU were paired with teachers of various grade levels from area schools in a mentor relationship. Over the duration of the year, the students weekly went to the classrooms, and then, for the month of April, the teachers turned their classes over entirely to the NNU student-teachers who were on their own and in charge.

"I gained confidence in my ability to teach at various grade levels due to the multigrade-level experience," said Kyla Edelman. "And the chance to become a part of the school's staff for an entire year was a wonderful opportunity."

In addition to the PDS program, NNU initiated its nursing program. The new discipline offered a rigorous work schedule and challenging homework, but nursing majors praised the new program as a good opportunity. "It's a lot of work, but it's worth it, and I know that I'm learning what I will need to know in my career," said sophomore Denae Jarvis. "The nursing program was just added, and plans to strengthen the courses in the next year are underway," said Dr. Judith Stocks, "The next year will bring a more developed program, and bigger opportunities."






