
Institutions have chapters in their existence...oftentimes marked by tenure of presidents. During his tenure:

- (3) Grow while keeping mission and purpose.


















Malibu Days


























TWIRP

























Homecoming































Idaho Family Christmas


The Importance of Being Earnest

In one corner—pumpkin painting— in another—a Sponge-Bob bounce house, and over 25 NNU students participating in CHAOS, a community outreach activity, this past Saturday morning from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Johnson Sports Center Field house.

Rylee Curtis, NNU campus ministries coordinator, planned and led the event that hosted 17 children from Hope House and the Nampa community at a day camp Saturday morning.

Higdon earns research grant

Northwest Nazarene University's newest student to enter the realm of scientific professionalism is Johanna Higdon.

Recently headlining the pages of the NNU's Messenger, Higdon's current research in the scientific field is not going unnoticed.

The study includes a broad examination of alcohol's effect on the human metabolism and which specific enzymes are in turn also affected.

Present NNU research pertaining to this study varies between the specific areas of investigation.

Higdon's work specializes in the cell's reaction to alcohol absorption.

"For my research I have plates of cells that I then introduce to ethanol, alcohol, and vitamin A. I then wait to see how the metabolism reacts," said Higdon.

The overall study was established to research detrimental illnesses such as fetal alcohol syndrome and alcohol generated cancer.

Higdon's interest in this field began at an early age.

As a child she frequently fed her investigative mind with medical-type procedures on local wildlife, such as dead salamanders found near a pond.

"I would spend time gathering and labeling items while pretending to be a real scientist," said Higdon, concerning her early interest in research.

As Higdon's interest grew more serious, she was given educational opportunities.


These learning opportunities allowed herself to explore what she wanted to do as an occupation dealing in the field of science.

During her junior year of high school, Higdon was given the chance to shadow OB/GYN doctors at Oregon Health & Science University.

Since being a part of NNU's science program throughout her college career, Higdon has heavily involved herself in a variety of research opportunities.

For the past two summers and both 2007 and 2008 school years, Higdon has worked with Dr. Jennifer Chase in lab research.

Such involvement, along with scientific conference attendance, led to two grants

The Special Olympics begin, and SIFE pitches in

The 2009 Special Olympics World Games began this weekend, and NNU has joined the festivities.

The NNU SIFE club is fulfilling personal success skills and environmental sustainability criteria with its involvement in the games.

The project started as a way to "green" the games, but it turned into a more personal experience for those involved.

"There's just a Special Olympic pride here," said project leader Ree Armstrong, a senior accounting major.

"A lot of the community is involved and is learning about the games as well as just enjoying and being inspired," Armstrong said.

"It's really good to get to know people who are running now and also past athletes who have run in the games," says former special athlete Stephenie Hunt. She ran in track as well as participated in hurdles, long jump and the 30 meter relay.

Before the big event, SIFE collaborated with Wal-Mart and the Games Organizing Committee to stuff 2,200 bags for the athletes, 1150 bags for delegates and coaches and 300 gift bags for the media.

The bags offered encouragement for the receivers to be more environmentally friendly. Included in the bags were a flash drive with "green" tips as well as a spuddy buddy, a water bottle, lotion, a hand knit scarf (the Games received 55,000 blue and white scarves to give to athletes and supporters made by various people around the globe), trading pins for the athletes and other little items.

SIFE also included NNU in the project by making a mural with steps made by NNU for the games as well as highlights of the athletes.

On Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, pieces of the mural will be located near NNU's



The night was a funny reminder that social life at NNU is, in many ways, one big inside joke, with each new event relying on the ones before it.



Themes included golf,




SAAC raised additional money for the Make-a-Wish Foundation with their donation tables in the Johnson Sports Center during the men's and women's basketball games Saturday night.

Inauguration focused on 'Renewing the Covenant'

During his official inauguration last Thursday, President David Alexander announced several new initiatives and programs for NNU.

During the ceremony, the congregation joined in singing several hymns, led by Barry Swanson. The ceremony featured a choir composed of current students and alumni, who sang a few special pieces.

President Alexander gave

his inaugural address with an emphasis on "Renewing the Covenant." This culminated in the congregation joining Alexander in a covenantal pledge promising to uphold NNU's outcomes and ideals and serve the students and staff.

Alexander laid out plans for the new School of Nursing and Health Sciences, as well as a new masters of nursing program, which will be lead by Professor Pat Kissel as the school's new dean. He also announced the creation of a new department in the school's administration, designed to promote spiritual growth on campus.

The Wesley Center for Student Leadership will have three different offices: the Office of Spiritual Formation, administered by the dean of the chapel; the Office of Congregational Development, that will connect NNU with churches from around the world; and the Office of Kingdom Engagement, which will facilitate students' desire to provide

service to the community.

"This center is being established to focus on and foster the NNU distinctive. We are a people of faith who seek to follow Christ's model of servant living, and we believe that we can have the greatest impact on society through service," said Alexander.

The new center will be directed by Rev. Fred Fullerton, who will fill the newly created position of vice president for spiritual and leadership development.

"It will be my joy to work

with the university community, pastors and district leadership in the development and implementation of President Alexander's vision," said Fullerton in online press materials.

The ceremony was followed by a reception in the Johnson Sports Center, where students, alumni and faculty fellowshiped, and were the given the chance to greet the Alexanders.

The week was one of mission work and sightseeing and while the team was excited about catching a viewing of


the Broadway show "Wicked," the highlights for many involved working with the Harlem relief bus and the Yorkville Food Pantry.

The team was awarded the Good Award in Individual Events Sweepstakes in addition to the individual awards, which Assistant Director of Forensics Litha Quinn said was "definitely a team win for everybody."

NNU's Director of Forensics Brooke Adamson said, "This is one of the few times we have ever had two representatives in the Showcase to demonstrate one of the best competitors in their event in the nation—Rachel Allen in Prose Interpretation and Jason Montgomery in Impromptu Speaking."

Adamson was named governor of the province of the great west, putting her in charge of all the schools belonging to the Pi Kappa Delta Honorary west of the Mississippi.

Junior Jason Montgomery earned the most awards with a total of three. He earned a Superior Award in Impromptu Speaking, placing fourth out of 182, an Excellent Award in Communication Analysis, ninth out of 56, and an Excellent Award in Broadcast Journalism.

The other members of the team, Rachel Allen, Blair Evans, Julia Fitch and Allison Hawn, all won either superior or good in their events, according to a campus-wide e-mail sent out.

The team was only made up of five competitors, compared to some other schools whose teams were made up of 25 competitors.

It was outstanding for the team to win the Good Award Sweepstakes, beating out 37 other schools, said Adamson and Quinn. When explaining the award system for Pi Kappa Delta, Adamson said, "This tournament does awards by percentages. The top percent is superior, next percent is excellent, and the last percent of awards is good."

Outside of competition, the team had time to experience some Louisiana culture, which Quinn said was a "fun award for everybody."


