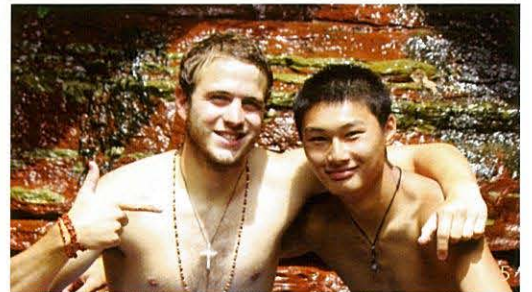
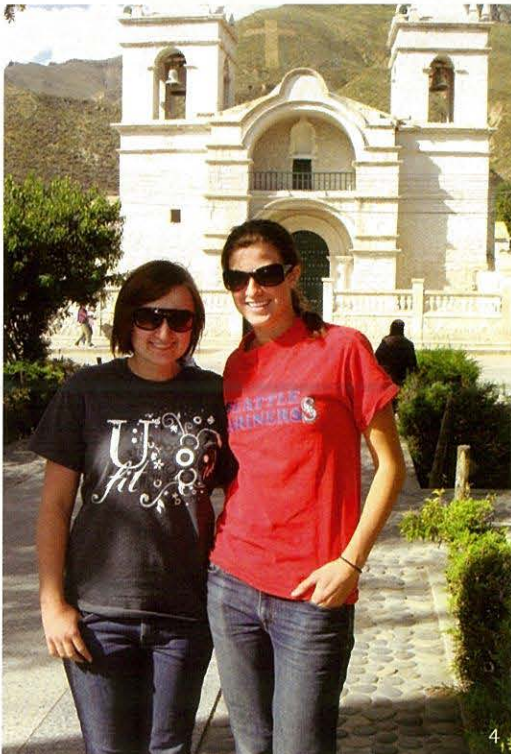


Summer missions

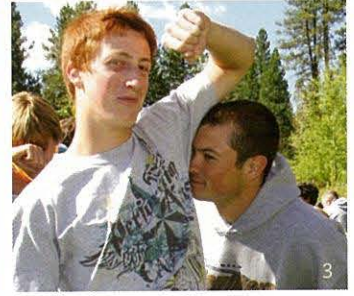


freshman retreat

The Crusader men just returned from a trip to Hawaii, where they opened up their season, going 2-1.

The team started with a strong showing against Chaminade University, beating them 4-0. They came out early, scoring in the ninth minute, thanks to a long distance shot from junior Alex Mangeac. Senior John Stump found the net twice, once on his own, and once through an assist from junior Ben Mangeac. Stump and Ben Mangeac connected again, setting freshman Evan Horwood with an assist. The Crusaders were dominant, outshooting Chaminade, 26-2.

The next day, the team lost to BYU-Hawaii, 4-1. Both teams came out firing, with BYU scoring early, followed a minute later by a NNU goal from freshman John DiLulo. NNU's quick retaliation was in turn followed up by another BYU goal a minute later, putting them up 2-1, a lead they would not lose. Despite the loss, the Crusaders held an advantage in shots, 10-8, but failed to connect.

The Crusaders finished up the road trip with a tight game against Hawaii Pacific. Sophomore Salvador Sanchez helped the team go home happy, scoring the games only goal, off an assist from senior Brock Ogami.

"Hawaii has been a great trip," said junior Mitch Rice, "there has been a lot of bonding on

The trip has helped increase team chemistry, which Rice felt was "higher than it has ever been for us as a soccer team." Rice believes that the closeness will help the team be more competitive, "we should play more as a team and less as individuals."

This year, the Crusaders have added size to the roster. "The last few years we have always been a small team and we seemed to get pushed around for it. But, this year our incoming freshmen and our returners are getting a lot more aggressive and physical in practice, which transfers over to the games," said Rice.

These additions add onto a team that features two players who were named to GNAC honors last year, Renatto Brito and John Stump. Brito, now a senior, was named the GNAC Newcomer-of-the-Year, as well as making second team all-conference. Fellow senior, John Stump, was named honorable mention.

The team looks to build off their successful trip to Hawaii, and build a strong season. "We really want to make it to the post-season," said Rice. "Which means winning conference. It's a realistic goal if we stay strong and work together."

The Crusaders will take on College of Idaho this Friday, here at 6:00. They then start their GNAC season on the 23rd, when they face off against Western Washington at home.

Survey: less than half of college-aged Christians attend church

Some may think that students who choose to attend a Christian university would almost automatically attend church weekly. There is no arguing that some students do attend church routinely as a staple in their week, but there are others who feel differently towards church attendance.

"I feel that NNU students that have grown up attending church probably have a sense that it is important," said Michael Kipp, assistant professor of practical theology. "Those who have not attended church in the past may not understand the value."

According to a 2007 survey by LifeWay Research, featured in USA Today, "Seven in 10 Protestants ages 18 to 30 — both evangelical and mainline — who attended church regularly in high school said they quit attending by age 23. And 34 percent of those said they had not returned, even sporadically, by age 30. That means about one in four Protestant young people have left the church." In a 2010 survey of 1,200 18- to 29-year-olds, also done by LifeWay Research, 65 percent of self-proclaimed Christians "rarely or never attend worship services."

Megan Krebs, a freshman, believes in the importance of church attendance. "A person needs to have an active relationship with the Church, not a static one," she said.

Dr. Tom Oord, professor of theology and philosophy, said, "I think most students know that in theory attending church regularly is important, but in practice they may not be so faithful."

What keeps students from attending church? One factor may be the requirement to attend chapel and religion classes at NNU. Dan Benjamin, a junior, spends Sunday mornings recovering from a busy week, he said. While he believes church is a time to receive a purposeful message, he does not attend because "with chapel three times a week I feel like I receive three messages every week," he said.



Do chapel and theology classes replace the need for church attendance? Dr. Mark Maddix, dean of the Theology and Religion Department, doesn't think so. He stresses the importance of being involved with a church. "Even though NNU is a Christian university which provides chapel, Bible study groups, and religion classes that are very formative in a student's spiritual life, NNU does not replace the local Church. The local Church is still the primary avenue where the people of God center around Word and Table," Maddix said.

Another factor that may keep students from attending a church is the difficulty of finding the right fit. The idea of "church shopping" may overwhelm college students. It is difficult enough for some students to integrate successfully into college, balance school and a social life, and then address the intimidation of finding a church that fits them.

"I think it is hard for students to visit churches because many of them are larger than what they are used to. They often get lost in the crowd and don't get connected," Maddix said. "Maybe our churches need to be more intentional in finding ways to make (students) feel more welcomed and to provide opportunities for them to connect with others." But Maddix also places responsibility with the students. "After students have shopped around, they need to settle into a church where they can worship and participate in ministry," he said.

Chelsea Pounds, a freshman, attends church because "the Church is the body of Christ; it's a place where people are there for you. The Church is like a home where you grow and feel safe there."

Do Christian values need to be demonstrated in regular Sunday morning worship attendance? Is finding the right church complicated? Fresheree: A mesh of cross-dressers and super heroes

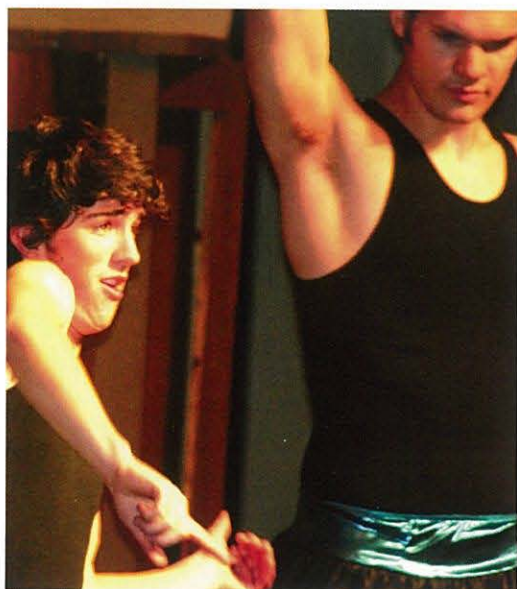

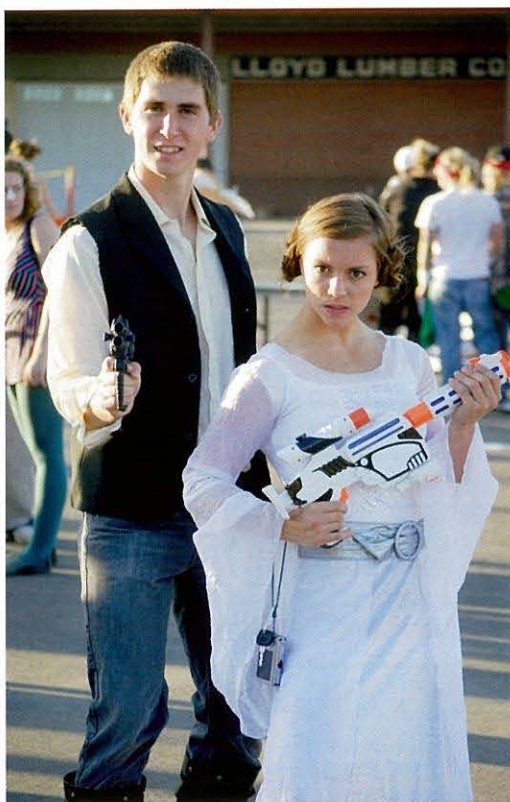
The show ended with an awesome custom rendition of the evolution of dance that was a great finale to a thoroughly entertaining evening.

2010 highlights from our world and Nation

As every year does, 2010 came to an end in true style. It was a year when we saw change in ourselves, the people around us, at NNU, in the United States, and around the world. Here's a look at what happened in 2010:

WORLD HIGHLIGHTS

Haiti Earthquake, Jan. 12

A devastating 7.0 earthquake struck Haiti, the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, on Jan. 12. The epicenter was just 10 miles out of the capital city, Port-au-Prince. According to Yahoo News, because of virtually no building regulations, buildings toppled "like paper." The death toll was estimated at 250,000 people, who either died in the initial earthquake, or in hospitals from secondary diseases or dehydration.

The news of Haiti did not die quickly. It was re-ignited when a small group of Americans were caught trying to take 33 children out of the Haiti to an orphanage in the Dominican Republic.

The leader of the group, an Idahoan named Laura Silsby, stayed in the Haitian jail for over 100 days, the longest out of the other 10 group members. The charge against her of kidnapping was dropped, but she was convicted of arranging illegal travel, the Idaho Statesman said.

Americans raised \$61 million during a Hope for Haiti telethon, and the American Red Cross raised \$461 million by October. But by the end of 2010, Haiti is nowhere near rebuilt. It will take a lot of work in 2011 for the country to see any stabilization again.

Guatemala Sinkhole, May 30

Although not as well known to some, Guatemala experienced a world phenomenon. A perfectly round sinkhole, 66 feet wide and 100 feet deep, opened up in the middle of an intersection. "The crater formed overnight, stunning scientists and riveting people, as the gaping maw grew large enough to swallow up a three-story clothing factory," said Yahoo News.

Sinkholes are caused by underground water that weakens the bedrock. Some claimed it to be a broken sewage pipe that had invaded the bedrock, while others said there was absolutely no way this could have been the cause.

Winter Olympics, Feb. 12-28

The XXI Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver, BC. started out as what some would consider a disaster: the death of Georgian luge

competitor Nodar Kumaritashvili in a training run before the Olympics began, not enough snow for skiing, and then an abundance of snow, shortly followed by the malfunction of the torch at the opening ceremonies, and finally the breaking of an ice machine which delayed the long-track speed skating event. Despite this, the games continued as usual. "Approximately 2,600 athletes from 82 nations participated in 86 events in 15 disciplines," said the NY Daily News.

Canada finally got its hand on gold, after not receiving any in the two previous Olympics held in Canada. They also got the gold medal they most desired in over-time against the United States in Ice Hockey.

The United States, Germany and Canada pulled ahead with the most medals, with 37, 30 and 26 per country, respectively. Canada earned 14 gold medals, more than any other country in this Olympics; Germany won 10 gold medals, and the United States tied with Norway at nine.

Apolo Ohno also became the most decorated American in Winter Olympic history, winning eight medals in his career.

Chilean miners, Aug. 5 - Oct. 13



On Aug. 5, 33 Chilean miners were trapped 2,300 feet below ground in a gold and silver mine. For 17 days, crews worked to gain information about their situation. On Aug. 22, a note came back notifying the crews that the miners were still alive.

They created a hole that was big enough to send food, water, clothes, and medicine down to the trapped men. They also sent down a small video camera so they could stream live and talk to their families.

One miner's daughter was born while he was trapped. He was able to watch the whole thing live. Her name was to be Carolina, but he asked them to change it to Esperanza, meaning Hope.

On Oct. 13, Yahoo News reported, "Journalists descended on the site as the hour grew near, and more than 3,000 people gathered to watch the rescue on giant TV monitors in the nearby provincial capital, Copiapo, hometown of most of the miners. Millions more watched worldwide on TV or online." Each miner was brought up in a capsule to safety wearing sunglasses donated by Oakley. The 33 miners were all treated and are safe back at home.

Greece Debt Crisis

As of March, Greece's national debt at \$413.6 billion (€300 billion), more than the country's economy. "Years of unrestrained spending, cheap lending and failure to implement financial reforms left Greece badly exposed when the global economic downturn struck," CNN reported on March 26. The debt threatened other countries' economies and the value of the euro.

UNITED STATES HIGHLIGHTS

Oil Spill, April 20 - July 15



The oil spill, the largest one in the gulf since 1979, started on April 20 at the Deepwater Horizon, an oil rig in the Gulf of Mexico. Eleven workers went missing and were later announced dead. This was soon overlooked as the threat of a catastrophic oil spill started, stated Yahoo News.

The American public was by no means happy with BP for what seemed to be a lack of organization and initiative in the process. "By June, the public anger against BP and its bumbling CEO reached a crescendo and was mercilessly parodied," said Yahoo News. In July, BP finally secured a cap on the gushing oil, but after months, the oil's toll on the surface was apparent. "By November, most of the gulf was open for fishing, but worrying signs of deep-sea damage — such as a die-off of bottom-dwelling coral — warned of many uncertainties

ahead," reported Yahoo News. The spill covered more than 4,000 square miles of ocean surface. More than 4 million barrels of oil leaked into the Gulf of Mexico before the leak was fixed.

Military Operations

On June 23, President Obama removed Gen. Stanley A. McChrystal as military commander in Afghanistan because he had "badly damaged the chain of command and could no longer work effectively with the civilian leadership at a crucial moment in the war," said the Washington Post. Gen. David Petraeus, who had served as commander in Iraq, replaced him. McChrystal had served in the army for 34 years.

After seven years of combat operations in Iraq and a bill around \$1 trillion, the United States withdrew the remainder of combat troops on Aug. 31. President Obama told the Associated Press that the removal of troops was not a sign of a "victory lap," and the United States still had much work to do to ensure that Iraq will be an "effective partner with us." The war was launched to remove former Iraqi president Saddam Hussein and enforce a democratic government. More than 4,400 U.S. soldiers and 100,000 Iraqi civilians lost their lives as a result of the operation. "Now that the Iraq war is over - for US combat troops, at least - only one thing is clear about the outcome: We didn't win," the Washington Post said on Sept. 1.

Recession

Although not starting in 2010, a major part of many of our lives was the constant reminders of the recession, although statistics showed that it was a year of improvement in many ways. Though reported to be over as of June, the wounds from the recession still penetrated many Americans.

"The fear that the next paycheck could be the last one is rampant and not wholly unfounded," reported Yahoo News.

Health Care Bill, March 21

After a monumental election in 2008, Obama set forth to hold up his campaign ad by reforming health care for America. In 2010, a bill was passed that would provide the opportunity for all Americans to experience health care coverage. This bill, expected to cost around \$900 billion dollars, is still on the forefront of debate going into 2011. On Jan. 19 of this year, the House passed legislation to repeal the health care law, 245-189. "Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., has vowed to block the measure, and Obama has threatened to veto it," USA Today reported that same day.
