Differences Between Love And Infatuation

5. Is often the term applied to past attachments.
6. Tends to focus more frequently on unsuitable person.
7. Parents more often disapprove.
8. Narrowly focused on a few traits; mostly physical thrill.
9. Less frequently accompanied by ambition and wide interests.
10. Feelings of guilt, insecurity, and frustration are frequent.
11. Tends to be self-centered and restricted.
12. Boredom is frequent when there is no excitement or social amusement.
13. Little change in the relationship with the passing of time.
14. Problems and barriers are often disregarded; idealization may have little regard for reality.

Our week began with a very special speaker, Dr. L. T. Corlett, president of our Nazarene Theological Seminary. Dr. Corlett has had wide experience in relation with our Nazarene schools as he was Dean of Religion at Bethany-Peniel College and also President of Northwestern Nazarene College. He brought an inspiring message using the story of the talents from the scripture and an outstanding thought was, "Neither man or God can help someone under the disease of self-pity."

On the following day Dr. Mackey gave one of his timely talks on the thought of "Let the words of my mouth and the manifestations of my heart be acceptable unto thee O God." We had another special speaker on Monday. He was Rev. Dallas Baggett from Alabama who gave us a message on the comforting thought, "Christ is a Refuge." He brought out the thoughts that Christ is a better refuge because he is safer, nearer, and more universal than any other.

Dr. Corlett was again with us on Thursday with a message on "Living Today." He presented several basic problems youth has to meet today. These were (1) security (cont. on page 4 col. 3)

Clio Society
Visit Jacksonville

On Wednesday, November 11, members from the Clio Society accompanied by Dr. Gresham began their trip to Florida to attend the Southern Historical Association meeting and see some of the historical sights.

The first major stop was at the Olustee Battle Field. This was the scene of an important battle during the Civil War and as was stressed by one of the members, the Confederates won. The first session of the Historical Society was on Thursday. The groups were divided into classes with several doctors lecturing on various countries and states.

On Friday night the group attended the historical association banquet. The retiring president of the Southern Historical Society, Dr. Kathryn Hanna gave an inspiring talk which proved to be a great challenge. Each member of the group was given a ticket which entitled him to go sight-seeing on Saturday.

Among the sights seen were: the oldest wooden school house in America which is located in St. Augustine, the oldest fort which is in Jacksonville, the Suwannee River, and Ponce De Leon's Fountain of Youth which was seen at a distance. A highlight of the sight-seeing tour was the ocean which some of the group had never seen before.

The trip was very profitable to the group in that it gave them the privilege of seeing some of the sights which are prominent in our history.



Truman Vs. Brownell

The late Harry Dexter White has become prominent in the national news again. Several days ago Attorney General Herbert Brownell charged former President Harry S. Truman for promoting White from assistant secretary of the treasury to U. S. Executive Director of the International Monetary Fund. This promotion was made despite FBI reports that White was a Russian Spy. These reports were sent to the White House in the early part of 1946.

Mr. Truman refused to testify before Senator McCarthy's (R-Wis.) investigating committee. Instead, he gave an address which was broadcast nationally over radio and television. The former President in a dramatic manner explained his side of the situation. In reference to the Attorney General's accusation he declared, "This charge is, of course, a falsehood, and the man who made it had every reason to know it is a falsehood . . . he lied to the American people." In the latter part of the speech he lambasted McCarthyism. "It is the corruption of truth . . . the spread of fear and destruction of faith in every level of our society." The Republicans are backing Brownell; the Democrats are continuing to stand for Truman.

Within twenty-four hours after Truman's speech FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover swore that the former President's promotion of White "hampered" FBI surveillance of the alleged Soviet spy. Also several congressmen offered their impression of Truman's speech. Rep. Harold Velde (R-Ill.), chairman of the house un-American activities committee that also unsuccessfully subpoenaed Truman to testify on the White case, said: "A typical smear attack on investigating committees . . . certain portions of the speech were obviously written by the Democrat ADA (Americans for Democratic Action) crowd." Senator McCarthy referred to Truman's address as an "Attack upon me."

The turkey flew down to the orchard for comfort but not before he gobbled gobs of news to me about you... on the Tower.

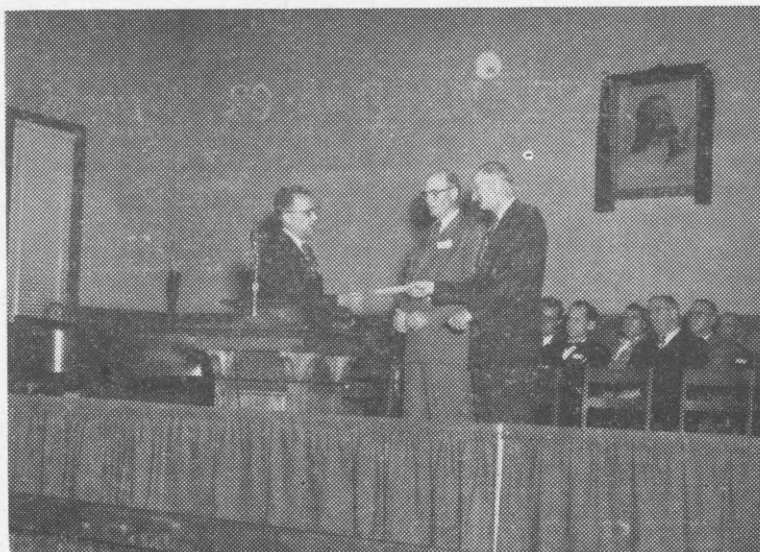

Kentucky Caravan Visits Trevecca

"Thank you, and thank you again", were the words of our president, Dr. Mackey, to the East Kentucky Caravan after receiving the annual T. N. C. budget of \$42,000 dollars from Rev. D. S. Sommerville, district superintendent. After a banquet in the cafeteria the members of the student body met with the East Kentuckians in the McClurkan Building for a brief service. The district treasurer, Rev. Asa Sparks and the district superintendent had the privilege of presenting the largest budget in history to Trevecca College.

On Monday, November 16, about 4:00 in the afternoon, a caravan of nearly twenty cars lead by a police escort came upon the campus of T. N. C. Shortly afterwards the Kentuckians were welcomed by Charles Duckett, Prof. Phillips, and Dr. Gresham on the steps of the Administration Building. Later in the day the caravan was given a banquet by the Kentucky club, with R. T. Kendall acting as master of ceremonies. joyable.

The program opened with the entire group singing "My Old Kentucky Home." The college choir rendered the Alma Mater and two other selections. After a delicious meal a special song was sung by Danny Godby. The keynote address was given by Dr. Mackey. He spoke of the progress that the Church of the Nazarene was making in education, and how Trevecca was gaining both spiritually and materially.

Almost 125 people were represented from the East Kentucky district. This included several pastors of the district, along with many young people who hope to attend Trevecca some time in the future. Many Trevecca students are looking forward to seeing some of them next fall.

After the evening service in the Alumni Auditorium the dormitories were opened for "open house." This climaxed the evening and helped make the East Kentuckians stay more interesting and enjoyable.
