Attitude is Everything

I'll say the same thing that I said the last time I visited the editorial page of the newspaper: "You've got to act like an adult if you want to be treated like one." The simple fact is this: any student complaint, regardless of its truth or its relevance or its originator, will not be given the attention the complainer feels is justified. The reason: complaints from average Trevecca students, which are already too prevalent to begin with, are for the most part delivered with a negative and vindictive attitude. Now, if even I, as average a Trevecca student as there is, would not listen to

someone who presented a grievance, genuine or otherwise, in the pouty manner of some, how much more will members of the administration not listen to such complaints? Listen closely: I do not blame administrators for treating students like "punk kids" if the treatment is justified by the student's attitude.

I understand the need to vent one's anger and frustration on occasion. I myself have done it a number of times. The key is the way in which one goes about venting one's anger and frustration. We do not have to look very far back into history to see some examples of how this

should not be done. I'm sure we were all at least moved by the folks who, fired from their jobs, returned a few days later and vented their frustration with shotguns. I'm sure we all have opinions on the folks who, claiming right-to-life or some other worthy cause, have resorted to civil disobedience and even vigilantism to vent their frustrations.

But there comes a time for idiocy to cease. The last time I spoke with you I maintained that I was not delivering a personal attack. Obviously, that didn't work, because there are still people who would waste newsprint to vent o v e r a c t i v e

frustrations and present irrelevant grievances in a manner inconsistent with the mature adult understanding they claim to possess. Maybe this time I should get personal. I admit that it's hard for me not to do so when there are so many worthwhile targets.

A word of advice, if I may, to everyone who has a legitimate grievance with how things happen around here. (Yes, that does mean that I think some complaints are justified, even though I may not agree). If you want to enact change in a system you perceive as flawed, do not rob your arguments of the strength they

may have by presenting them in this vindictive and negative manner. Work within the system, utilizing the means the system—if it is worthy even to be called such—has provided for evaluation and change.

The only question of seeming and being here relates to the way in which the argument against campus improvement policies is presented. A theme of the Trevecca baseball team is applicable—"Attitude is Everything". An admirable proficient command of "Latin syntax" means nothing if one's attitude is that of a spurned, shot-gunning vigilante. ◊

5. Least likely to graduate on time—Gerron Showalter

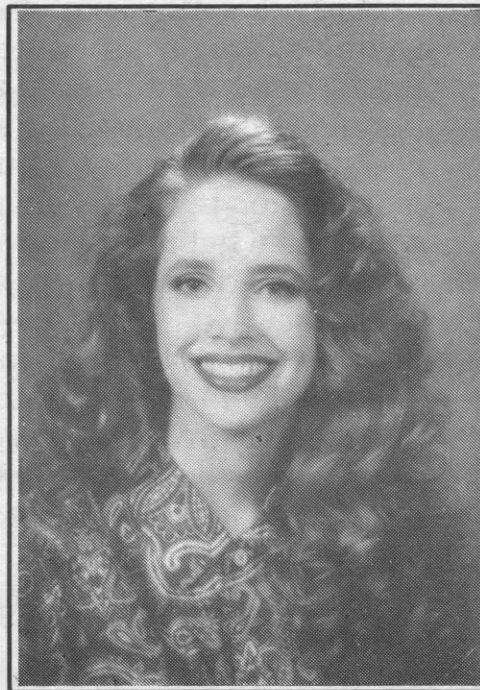
6. Most likely to be next Nazarene General Superintendent—Jeff McVay.

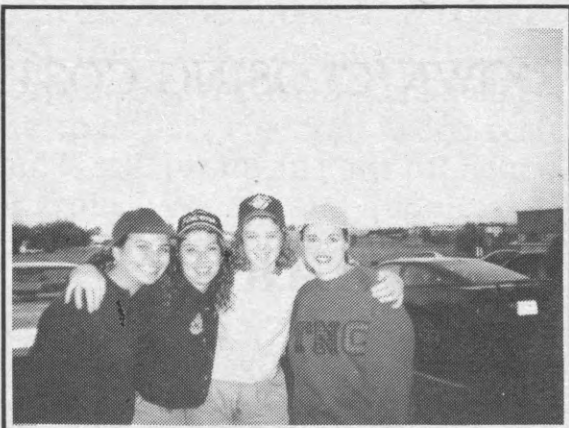

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Perfect Love

In the words of Brennan Manning, when he crossed paths with the students at Trevecca Nazarene College, "Hi."

Thielicke has said, "Verbiage is too often the fig leaf which does duty as a covering for theological ignorance. Sounding periods are offered instead of sound doctrine, and rhetorical flourishes in the place of robust thought. Such things ought not to be."

Anyone attending chapel the week ending April 8 would confess that Brennan Manning said a lot without saying a great deal, spoke to the heart without exhausting the lungs, and prodded the mind without provoking disagreement.

Robert Louis Stevenson has said, "The secret of style is to omit." Brennan Manning maintains that it all boils down to the one who loves the most. "The main difference is not between conservatism and liberalism, but between the aware and the unaware." For those who are aware of the undying, undeserved, unconditional love of Jesus Christ which expurgates the soul, there is abundance in being. For those who are unaware, or have failed to examine the boundless love available to them, there is only doubt and uncertainty. Furthermore, Manning suggested that awareness is only available through acceptance.

In regards to a campus

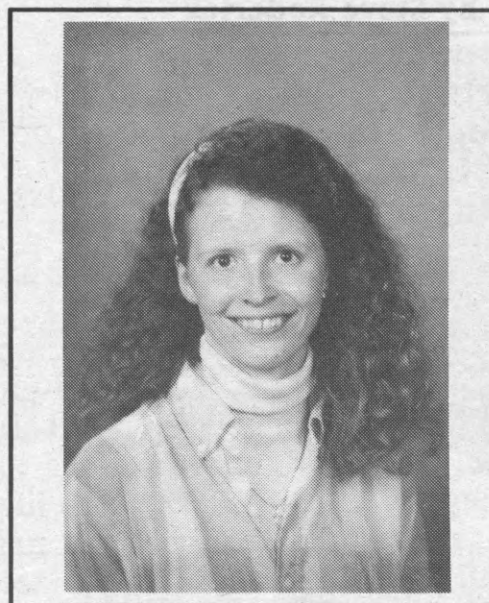
which embodies the likes of both the aware and the unaware, the accepting and the unaccepting, Brennan Manning leaves the following advice: "We either enhance the dignity of another, or we diminish it; there is no neutral exchange. The truest test of our faith is the way we are with one another. We need to become professional lovers of all."

Indeed, it appears as though we are blinded by our focus on "the yardstick of visibility" which stems from personal aversions. When measuring others with a love unaltered by Christ, we function as those who are unaware. Awareness is bound up in acceptance, and acceptance is bound up in love. Brennan Manning calls for an examination of love which exposes the degree to which one is actually aware. Awareness which promotes love for the homosexual, atheist, Calvinist, criminal, or anyone else with whom one might be in contact. A love which is without predetermined judgement and therefore enhances the dignity of others.

This same love when left unpurified by Christ has a tendency to diminish the dignity of others and results in a disposition characteristic of those who live life unaware. Love purified by Christ was referred to by Wesley as perfect love; Brennan Manning, the same. o

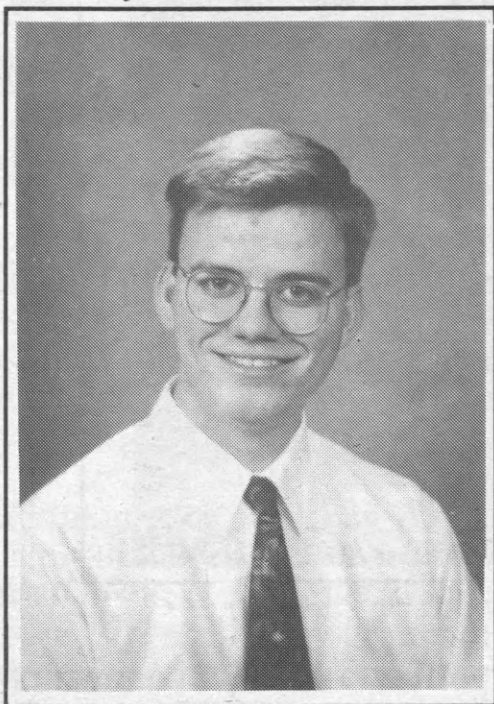

Eric has displayed his flexible leadership qualities off campus as well as on campus. He is currently treasurer of the senior class,

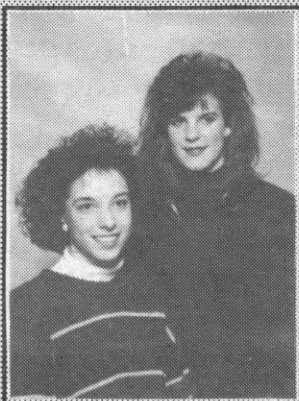

A Co-Initiative of the Christian College Coalition
and The Mustard Seed Foundation

The Harvey Fellows Program exists to support evangelical Christians who are or will be enrolled in top-rated graduate programs and who are preparing for leadership positions in strategic career areas. The Program seeks to:

- enable talented students who are committed to Christ to pursue graduate studies at outstanding universities;
- encourage Christians to consider vocational options that are culturally strategic, and where evangelical Christians are underrepresented;

A Grandmother in MHR. . .

Management and Human Relations major Brenda Denby exemplifies the spirit and tradition of the MHR Program. The 49-year-old grandmother of two will graduate with her Bachelor's degree Saturday — 22 years after she started college right here at TNC. Although most traditional Trevecca students leave home to come to college, the typical MHR student lives right here in Nashville. Brenda was the exception. In January of 1993, Brenda left her husband, church and every other aspect of her life in Lake City, Florida, to enter the MHR program. During her 13 months in Nashville, she lived in the married students apartments by herself, devoting the vast majority of her time and energy to her studies in order to see her dream of graduating from college come true. She only saw her husband Nick

a handful of times during the year, mostly on short weekend trips when the two would meet in Atlanta.

Brenda and Nick Denby were enrolled in Trevecca back in the early 1960s. They married in 1964 and Brenda dropped out of Trevecca soon after. They moved to Florida in 1968 where Nick went to work for the Florida Department of Transportation. Brenda regretted never finishing college but attempted to do so in Florida, taking classes here and there at a local community college while she raised a family and operated a flower shop. "There was that lack there. I just wanted to finish my education," Brenda said. But the longing involved more than wanting to finish college, Brenda said. Her family was launched, the flower shop was sold and it was time to see where the Lord wanted to use her next. Brenda felt very strongly that His plan involved

Trevecca. A quick call to TNC confirmed that. "It was divine that I got in MHR," she said. "I had no idea that there was anything like that program going on . . . I really feel it was God leading me." With Nick retiring from his job soon, Brenda is hoping her new status as a college graduate will enhance the couple's chances of serving on the mission field as volunteers. "We felt like if I had my degree that would open some doors for us." No matter what the future holds for Brenda and Nick, however, she's not waiting to use the skills and knowledge gleaned from the MHR Program. "When I got into it I saw how much it fit into my church work. I've used it since I've come home and related it to the church. I didn't find anything that was not useful." Brenda's project in MHR involved designing a manual and program to train lay

treasurers in small churches. "I'm really thrilled that our college offers this type of education for the older adult because I would not have felt comfortable in the traditional classroom . . . I was the oldest in my class, the only grandmother in the class. I felt comfortable in that type of setting and it made learning easy." Although Brenda didn't fit the typical mold of the MHR student, being Nazarene, a residential student, and traveling a long distance to come to college, she did have the same needs as the vast majority of MHR students. She needed a second chance to make up for past mistakes and for giving up and quitting school. She found the answer in MHR. "It was very hard . . . but it was a life changing experience," she said. "It's the desire of a lot of adults to finish something they started." ◊

And a Grandmother in the P.A. Program

Kate McDonough may be the first grandmother to graduate from the P.A. Program at Trevecca. At age 42, McDonough is doing her rotations—the final step of the Program.

After spending 12 years in the medical field as a medical assistant, Mrs. McDonough "finally got tired of saying 'The doctor will be with you in a minute!'" and took matters into her own hands. Having attended one year of college earlier in her life, she started going to night school and

taking mail-order courses from UT. At one point, she was taking 16 hours, and working both a full- and part-time job. She laughs about that now, commenting, "A book was with me everywhere I went!"

In 1992, she was accepted at Trevecca, and gave up working to become a full-time student. Although finances called for two incomes, Mrs. McDonough says that God provided for every need, and, although she is "not driving a Mercedes," her family is doing fine.

Mrs. McDonough has one semester left of the P.A. Program, and plans to enter the field of primary care—the basic field where there seems to be a shortage of qualified physicians and assistants. After two years, she wants to reassess her career and decide on her main field of interest—taking into consideration that she wants to stay in Nashville, where her grandchild lives. She finds the diagnosis process fascinating, since each case is different and calls for a new solution. She

also finds the interaction with the patients very rewarding, and looks forward to the more challenging position of physician's assistant for these one-on-one relationships. With

the practical experience she has already gained on the job coupled with the education received at Trevecca, Mrs. McDonough will be a valuable contribution to the medical field. ◊

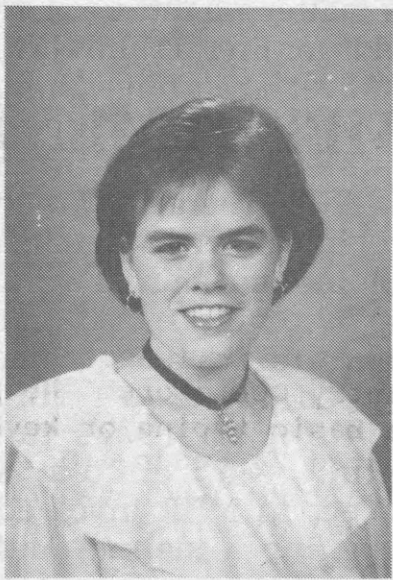

How has your faith grown being a student/athlete at a Christian School?

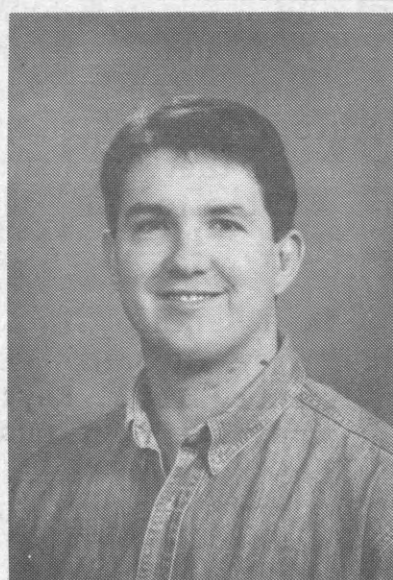

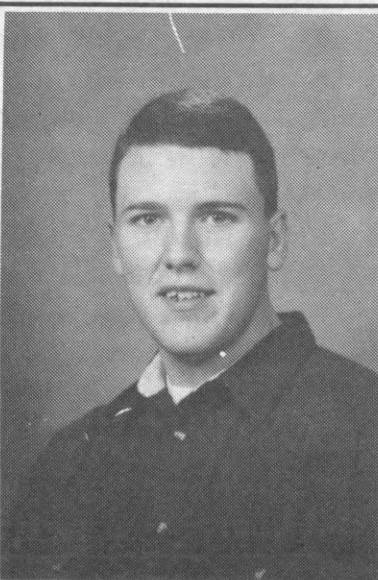

Great potential if they do the recruiting they need. We have some very good players now, but there are some weak spots. If they have good recruiting, they have a very good chance of having a great season.

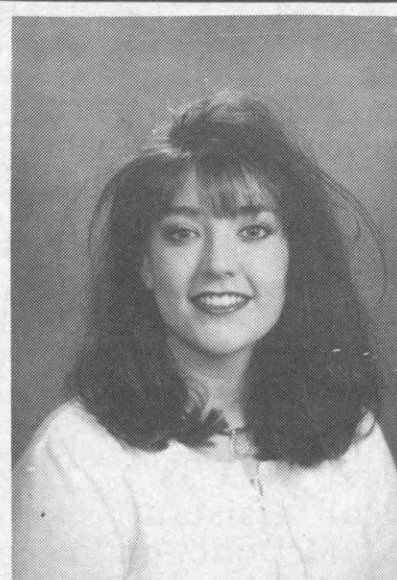

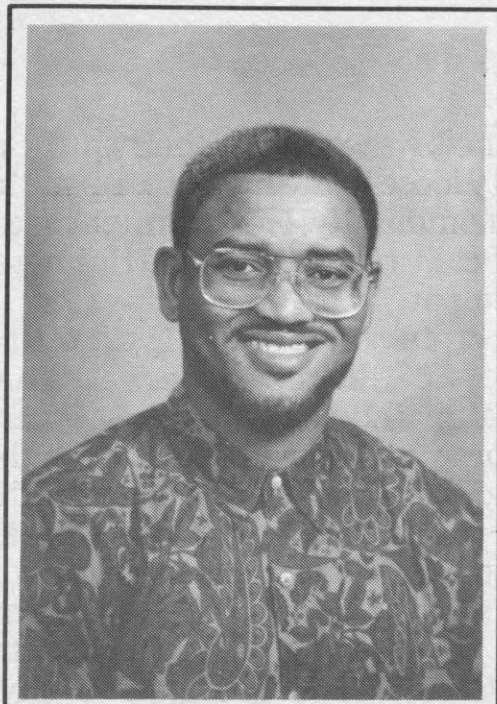

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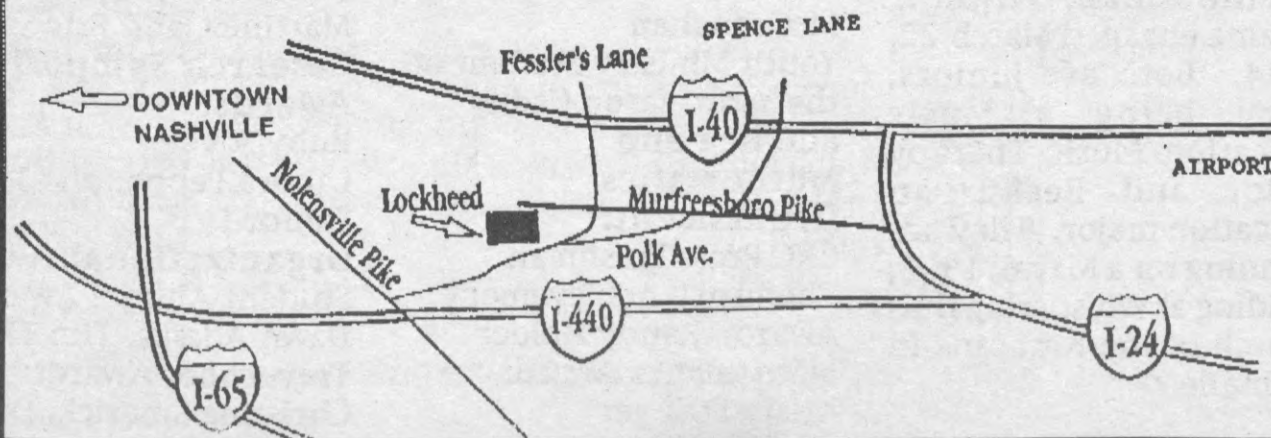
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Women Gather for Historic Conference

More than 300 women from 14 denominations and several countries attended the first International Wesleyan/Holiness Women Clergy Conference, April 14-17, in Glorieta, New Mexico.

It was a time for worship, prayer, sharpening ministry skills, and encouraging one another.

"I serve in a small church in a small town," one participant said. "I'm supposed to be a co-pastor along with my husband. I'm ordained, but the people just can't get used to the idea of a woman minister. I had just about given up hope, but this meeting has given me strength to keep going."

Convener and keynote speaker Susie Stanley of the Church of God (Anderson), said she wanted holiness clergy-women to be "flaming feminists—with that flame being the Holy Spirit."

Stanley and Wilbur Brannon were driving forces behind the

development of the conference which was endorsed and supported by the Church of the Nazarene, the Church of God (Anderson), the Wesleyan Church, the Free Methodist Church, and the Evangelical Friends. The sponsoring committee included: Stanley; Bonnie Braun, Free Methodist; Shirley Cathie, Church of God (Anderson); Nina Gunter, Church of the Nazarene; Retha McCutchen, Evangelical Friends International; and Lois Watkins, the Wesleyan Church.

"If they don't let you preach in the church, remember—every city block in this country has approximately four corners," Addie Wyatt, co-pastor of the Vernon Park (Chicago) Church of God (Anderson), told the conferees.

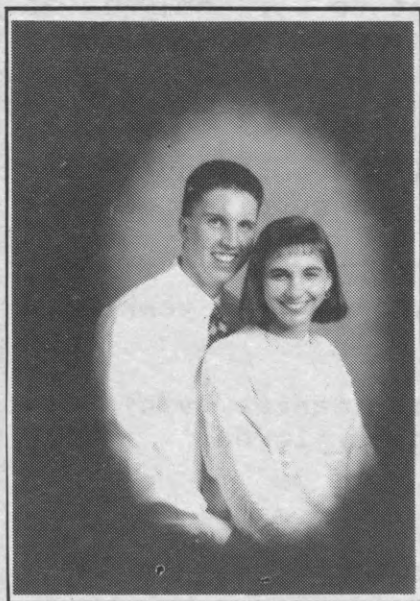
One denominational executive noted that if "instead of assigning our women preachers only to tiny churches already under a death

sentence, we would set their spiritual vitality loose in the mainstream of the faith community, we just might see a significant renewal of the (Holiness) movement."

Professor Jo Anne Lyon of the Wesleyan Church observed that several mainline denominations are snapping up women pastors from the Holiness tradition: "Nurtured in the Wesleyan movement, these women ministers have hearts that are set on fire," Lyon said. "But when we can't place them, the United Methodists and Presbyterians are glad to have them." She went on to urge the clergywomen to "stay at home in the Wesleyan/Holiness movement. We need you!"

Lyon, one of the featured speakers, declared the day would soon come when "we will not be known because of our gender or our ethnicity, but because we are ministers—that is, servants of Jesus."
