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PREFACE

I have heard it said that the most compassionate act and greatest blessing that followers of Christ can do for other people is to connect them with Jesus Christ. There is no question that the act of providing food and shelter to the unhoused is a blessing to them. There is no question that emotional support for grieving people is a blessing to them. There is no question that providing a bed for a child sleeping on the floor is a blessing both to the child and the parents. Acts of compassion for hurting people improve circumstances and open doors to the greatest blessing of all: to know Jesus Christ. A relationship with Jesus becomes the love, the light, and the life of God breathed into their very being through his Son. There is no greater blessing than that!

As followers of Christ, it should be our life's purpose to share the hope and love and salvation of Jesus Christ with those around us. The year 2024 was a year to focus on blessing our communities. The apostle Paul wrote that our work is produced by faith and that our labor is prompted by love (1 Thessalonians 1:3). Paul also wrote, "For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (Ephesians 2:10).

The year 2025 is a year to focus on bringing people to Jesus. This is God working in the lives of others through our faith, love, and good works. We are humbled when we remember Jesus's words, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6). This is God's work in which we have the privilege of participating. We also remember that everyone is invited to come to the Father. "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). This is God's defining work in the lives of broken people. Again, we are privileged to participate in what God is already doing.

Starting on Easter and running through—and beyond—Pentecost, the focus of prayer will be bringing people to Jesus. Will you pray with your brothers and sisters in Christ for God to move powerfully in the lives of those who are disconnected from God?

Sunday, April 20, 2025

Matthew 4:19

"Come, follow me," Jesus said, "and I will send you out to fish for people."

Scripture Insights

Throughout the Gospels, Jesus meets people where they are. He knows the needs, hopes, hurts, and dreams of those he encounters. And in all of this, Jesus provides exactly what they need.

Walking along the shore, Jesus sees fishermen. They are doing what they know when he invites them to fish for people: "Come, follow me!" Following him is to know Jesus and to be known by him. Following Jesus, they will receive the love of God and draw others to that love. Following him, they will experience new life and learn to share new life.

On this resurrection Sunday, we know Jesus has met all of us just where we are with exactly what we need. At the empty tomb, we experience the fullness of God's love and the gift of resurrection power at work within us and through us.

Right now, right where we are, the invitation is for us just like it was for those first disciples. Will we follow Jesus? And will we invite others to join us on this journey?

God, we give you thanks today for the empty tomb! May we be people who follow Jesus to meet people where they are, willing to sacrifice our all for your kingdom. Empower us by your Spirit to love, and embolden us to share the good news.

John 17:22-23

I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one—I in them and you in me—so that they may be brought to complete unity. Then the world will know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me.

Scripture Insights

Nothing Jesus did was casual. He was never rushed, but he was full of purpose. In the Gospel of Luke, we see Jesus demonstrating his determined will to fulfill the purpose for which his Father had sent him: the redemption of humanity. "As the time approached for him to be taken up to heaven, Jesus resolutely set out for Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51). That's purpose.

In today's scripture we catch a glimpse of our part in Jesus's purpose. Jesus is now in Jerusalem and is about to go to the cross to make the way for salvation to be accomplished. Before his arrest, Jesus spends time praying for you and me, that we would be one just as he and the Father are one. This was not a meaningless prayer for us to experience fuzzy sentimental emotions. In this deep and profound prayer, our Savior is praying that we will join him in fulfilling the purpose for which he was about to sacrifice his life on the cross—that the church of 2025, you and me, may be one as he and the Father are one, for the sake of unity. Then Jesus's purpose will be fulfilled in context of the 2025 communities we live in.

In a diverse USA/Canada context where, these days, our differences tend to divide us, even in the church, Jesus's prayer continues to resound loudly. Only supernatural power can accomplish what Jesus prayed for. That's why his promise of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost was so crucial to the success of his plan to use you and me. Praise God that we now live in the time when that power is available to us. Come, Holy Spirit, make us one as the Father and Son are one!

Today's Prayer

Father, as we journey from Easter to Pentecost and beyond, pour out your Holy Spirit on the Church of the Nazarene in the USA and Canada. Empower each of us to reach out with the love of Jesus in our hearts, and make us one so that the world will know Jesus in all his grace and mercy.

Mark 16:15

He said to them, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation."

Scripture Insights

Scripture gives us a consistent and compelling storyline that links the nature of God to movement and mission. God, in Jesus, moves out from heaven and toward humanity. In Mathew 28, Jesus tells us to go to make disciples, to baptize, and to teach. In Luke, Jesus sends out the seventy-two disciples and says, "Go! I am sending you like lambs among wolves."

Embedded within this language of going is the language of invitation. God is inviting us to be part of what the Holy Spirit is doing in our world. We can accept that invitation from God to go.

Perhaps more challenging is the fact that going is wrapped up in the invitation to be a guest. To go means we leave our place of comfort—the space we control, the reality we know—to accept someone's invitation to be a guest. Being a guest means a loss of control. This is a step of faith as we accept God's invitation to be sent for the sake of the good news.

Dear Jesus, we are thankful that you came to roll back the ravages of sin. You invite us into the hope of redemption and reconciliation. Help us to continue our yes to you to go and carry the good news of resurrection.

Psalm 96:3

Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples.

Scripture Insights

This missionary psalm inspired generations to send men and women to distant countries, carrying the message of God's greatness to the nations. Today, the nations have come to our own doorsteps. In our own neighborhoods, we encounter the very people for whom we once crossed oceans. Recently, as my wife and I reflected on this reality with my parents, we identified that our next-door neighbor is from Egypt, two houses down we have neighbors from Brazil, and across the street live a wonderful couple from Romania and a newly relocated family from Algeria.

God has brought the mission field to us, placing within our reach the opportunity to share Christ's love with the nations right here in our own communities. Evangelism isn't just about going out; it's also about welcoming in. Let's be intentional in building relationships with our neighbors, embodying the love of Christ, and declaring the goodness of God with the same passion as those who once journeyed to far-off lands. The mission hasn't changed, but our mission field certainly has.

Galatians 3:8-9

Scripture foresaw that God would justify the Gentiles by faith, and announced the gospel in advance to Abraham: "All nations will be blessed through you." So those who rely on faith are blessed along with Abraham, the man of faith.

Scripture Insights

Do you ever wonder who was first? First to drive a car, first to fly a plane, first to make and eat ice cream (true genius!)?

We don't need to wonder who was the first to hear the gospel and who was first to proclaim it. Paul tells us here that person was Abraham. He wasn't given a theological education either. Abraham heard and believed, and that's when his faith began. Then he shared the gospel simply by living. He didn't become a famous prophet or preacher; he was just a patriarch—the father of a big family—who allowed his faithful obedience to God do the work. Sure, Abraham wasn't perfect, but God is, and God worked in and through Abraham despite his imperfections. It wasn't Abraham's perfection that saved him but his faith.

Today, we enjoy the benefits of the gospel thanks to Abraham and the covenant God made with him. We would do well to learn from the first, and to start our fishing by simply being faithfully obedient to God.

Lord, we thank you for the faith of Abraham and the example he has set. We confess our belief in you and commit to living in faithful obedience. May others see that and be drawn into a relationship with you.

Mark 1:14-15

After John was put in prison, Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. "The time has come," he said. "The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!"

Scripture Insights

These are the first words spoken by Jesus in the Gospel of Mark. They highlight the essence of Jesus's preaching ministry: God's promised salvation is here; repent and believe!

As we focus on bringing people to Jesus, today's scripture gives us this simple message we need to share with non-believers. It isn't about being good enough already, or a list of rules and requirements. It's simply about asking for forgiveness of sins, turning from the old, believing in Jesus, and striving to grow in faith to become more like him.

As we share the good news, we aren't called to have all the answers, point out weaknesses, share all our personal ideas, rules, or beliefs on minor issues, or make sure they join our church. We simply need to share what it means to repent and believe, and express the joy we have through our faith in Christ and his leading in our lives.

Let's take Jesus's example. Make it simple and be clear: being a Christian means to repent and believe. After that, God will go to work in the new believer's life, and hopefully use us to disciple!

Lord, we pray right now for you to open our eyes to opportunities to share the simple message of salvation. Deliver us from any hesitation. Empower us with your words, and may your power and presence in us enable us to share freely. Remind us that you go before us and are already working in each soul.

Revelation 14:6

Then I saw another angel flying in midair, and he had the eternal gospel to proclaim to those who live on the earth—to every nation, tribe, language and people.

Scripture Insights

"It's happening now, Pastor!" a church member said to me during a Bible study on Revelation. The book of Revelation engulfed us in a labyrinth of scary imageries, visions, and various phases of a great battle that has lashed out on earth.

Unfortunately, most people have witnessed the constant struggle between good and evil, the forces of darkness and light, right versus wrong, and a world where hopelessness and chaos are daily realities that only a righteous King could deliver them from.

Though Revelation is not known to be an evangelistic book, today's scripture can offer us evangelistic hope in a world where evildoers, false prophets, and despotic leaders rule, leeching hope from people everywhere. The gospel of Jesus Christ is for every nation, tribe, language, and people.

Can God count on us to proclaim the eternal gospel of salvation to various people whose skin colors, languages, and ways of life differ from ours?

John 4:13-14

Jesus answered, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

Scripture Insights

I was recently looking for a new car, and the saleswoman showing me the car asked what I do for a living. When I told her I am a minister, she became emotional. She told me she had not been to church in years but had just attended the prior weekend for the first time in a long time. I asked her if she had committed her life back to God, and she replied she had not. Before I left, I had the opportunity to pray with her to return to Christ.

In John 4, we see that Jesus asks the Samaritan woman for a drink of water. He tells her of the living water that he gives, quenching thirst forever. This well of invitation, along with the rest of her lengthy conversation with Jesus, led her to tell many others about the Messiah.

Every day God can open wells of invitation that allow us to tell others about Jesus. We have this invitation from Jesus to share with those around us every day!

Romans 10:14

How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them?

Scripture Insights

Romans 10 is as hard a pill to swallow for the Israelites more than two thousand years ago as I believe Paul's words are a challenge to the church today. Paul is redirecting the Israelites who have skewed the message of salvation and righteousness through faith in Christ Jesus. Paul reminds us that God has a plan and that we have been healed and freed in order to execute the plan. No longer is our faith rooted in Mosaic Law but in the love of God for all in Christ Jesus.

Well-meaning believers beware! It's easy to believe we are living for the Lord while being distracted by polarizing issues and missing the Father's heart for his children and those who have yet to be invited to receive the gifts of God through Christ Jesus. Like the Israelites, Paul reminds us that if we aren't careful, we can defuse the powerful impact of the perfect work of Christ in our lives and forget that our purpose is to share the good news.

Today's Prayer

Help us, oh God! Revive in us a fresh revelation of the healing and freedom wrapped up in the gospel. May the fire of the Holy Spirit release that same healing and freedom of the gospel to fulfill our purpose of sharing the gospel.

1 John 4:9-10

This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins.

Scripture Insights

In these verses, we see God's ultimate love for us. He gave up his only Son to die on the cross for our sins so that we can live. God did this just for us. We didn't even love God, but he allowed his Son to die for us. His unconditional love was shown to us first.

This is the defining example of love. God's love allows us to love those people who don't love us, or who are different from us or who may not accept us. God gave Jesus the strength to die on the cross. God gives us strength and power to love and meet the needs of those around us. God's power can work through us to reach others for Christ.

Reaching people for Christ starts with caring about people where they are. Show them God's love, and he will take care of the rest. God displayed his love by the action of giving his only Son to die for our sins. Let us put God's love into action.

Romans 5:8

But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

Scripture Insights

"Demonstrate" is a powerful word that means "to clearly show the existence of something by giving proof." The fact that Christ died for us and chooses to forgive us when we are filled with sin is indisputable proof of God's love.

Two verses earlier in this chapter, Paul says that Christ died for the ungodly when we were powerless. Why is that demonstration important? Because we live in a cynical world that celebrates us when we succeed and rejects us when we fail; a world that questions God's existence; a world that wonders how a loving God could let atrocity happen.

Into that suspicious world, God offers a demonstration of his love that supersedes all arguments. God chooses to love us when we are at our worst, when we are unlovable. In other words, when you are at your lowest, his love is on full display. That demonstrated love lives in our hearts once we accept Christ. That demonstration transforms us from death to life. We are literally living proof of God's love, and we are called to demonstrate the love of God to the world. Who in your life needs a demonstration of God's love?

Today's Prayer

God, thank you for the demonstration of your love. Teach us how to demonstrate your love to others so they might find the same grace we have found, and help us always remember how your love changed our lives.

Scripture Insights

Scripture Insights

We long for leaders who will exercise authority with wisdom and sound judgment. We want them to use their positions to make the world a better place. As it was in ancient Israel, so it is for nations around the world today: some leaders are better than others, but rarely do any of them live up to their promises or our expectations.

Into a time of trials, wars, and ongoing threats from other world powers, the prophet Isaiah gave an oracle of hope. Scripture Insights

Have you ever watched children become distracted by critters or blades of grass while playing in the outfield during Little League? They are oblivious when the ball lands a few feet from where they are standing (or sitting). Only the children who keep their eye on the ball and are ready at any moment even have the opportunity to make a great catch. Imagine the opportunities we might find before us if we simply keep our eye on the ball and stand in the ready position.

In Ephesians 6, Paul tells us to prepare to share the good news of Christ. God invites us to reflect the truth of Jesus in all of our actions and words and to live with integrity and moral uprightness so we might attract others to the goodness of Christ and bring glory to God.

In the Gospels, impromptu parties seemed to follow Jesus around as the kingdom broke into everyday situations around him and brought people close to the Father and into new life. This kind of heaven-touching-earth occasion annoyed religious leaders who couldn't get their heads around how Jesus did things. But I think he was teaching us something profound about the kingdom. Can we be such spontaneous kingdom party people?

Father, thank you for each opportunity you give us to show your love and heart to the people around us. May we be such authentic, holy people that your kingdom breaks into all our gatherings, whether planned or spontaneous.

Luke 4:43

But he said, "I must proclaim the good news of the kingdom of God to the other towns also, because that is why I was sent."

Scripture Insights

After several hundred years of silence, the world was in a dark place upon the arrival of Jesus the Messiah. He came with the following primary mission: "to seek and save the lost" (Luke 19:10). He authenticated his deity with the healing of many, including Simon Peter's mother-in-law in the same chapter that today's scripture comes from. He also healed the centurion's servant and cast demons out of multiple people, including the man whose possession was so fraught and violent that he'd been banished to the graveyard.

However, what made Jesus tick was his incessant calling to "proclaim the good news of the kingdom of God." This same good news caused Peter and his brother, Andrew, along with James and his brother, John, to leave their fishing boats and families behind to come and follow Jesus (Matthew 4:18–22). Over the course of the next three years, these men would be transformed into powerful disciples, then apostles, who would carry out the mission of Jesus.

As I look at the news and hear yet another report of a school shooting, my heart is flooded with hurt and grief. Why did this happen? What motivates someone to go to such extremes? Do we need more metal detectors at our schools, or more restrictive gun laws? Is there any hope for our society? Yes, there certainly is! Jesus Christ makes all the difference. Lost and hurting souls need Jesus. Only Jesus can soothe the troubled heart and cause a restless soul to find peace in him.

Today's Prayer

Lord Jesus, we pray for peace in the lives of our children, young adults, and indeed anyone who needs your peace today, no matter their age. We pray that all who are troubled can develop an intimate, life-changing relationship with you, the transformer. May hurting and lost souls find peace in thee!

John 3:17

For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him.

Scripture Insights

Condemnation is always easier. As a personal survival technique, judgment is unparalleled. We deem others to be unredeemable. Putting others away from us and from our hearts by spiritually and emotionally removing them from the relational equation is far easier. It may even make us feel better about ourselves comparatively.

The act of saving is always more difficult. And it costs something. If you doubt this, ask our heavenly Father. How easy would it have been for God to send another flood? Just start over. Wipe out the human race and all traces of it. But God chose vulnerability.

It takes little effort for a parent to imagine what it would feel like to release their child into harm's way. Maybe ask a parent in an airport as they bravely hug their son or daughter into the arms of military service. God saved us as his Son died.

No professing Christian should have a judgmental bone in their body. We never condemn, not even ourselves. We live and breathe into the hope that God still saves. We have all been condemned by sin. We are all death-row inmates. Thank God that Jesus now has the key to freedom!

Heavenly Father, please forgive us when we choose not to look too deep and when we choose the protective fortress of judgment and condemnation. Change us, Lord. Make us a fit place for you to live. Glorify yourself through our repentance. Strengthen us to be vulnerable to others, especially the lost.

Paul didn't know the specifics of what lay ahead for him, but the Holy Spirit had already warned him that it would include chains and tribulation. Such forewarning from God might have caused anyone else to abandon the mission—yet Paul was undeterred! For him, proclaiming the good news of the risen Jesus was worth any cost, even his life.

Paul understood that, come what may, God would be especially good to him in the final season, and with that assurance, he continued running his race with joy.

Almighty God, you know what we are facing today and the things that are around the corner that we have yet to face. Empower us through your Holy Spirit to joyfully stay on mission, trusting that you will be especially good to us even through this season.

Scripture Insights

Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness.

Scripture Insights

Matthew wanted to show that Jesus was the Messiah, Emmanuel, God with us, ushering in the kingdom of heaven on earth. In chapters 8 and 9, we see Jesus bringing the kingdom into people's lives—engaging with them by teaching, preaching, and healing.

When I moved to Bethany, Oklahoma, I began to learn the history of the community. The city was established in 1909, by cofounder C. B. Jernigan, who facilitated the purchase of a piece of land located west of Oklahoma City on the El Reno Interurban Railway. Bethany became the new home for the Oklahoma Holiness College (now Southern Nazarene University), Bethany First Church of the Nazarene, and The Nazarene Rescue Home for Unwed Mothers and the Oklahoma Orphanage (now Bethany Children's Health Center). The commitment was to teach, preach, and heal. Today, the church, university, and children's health center continue the pattern established by Jesus of teaching, preaching, and healing.

How do we bridge the gap between our friends and Jesus today? We invest in our community at the point of people's intellectual, spiritual, and physical needs.

John 1:38-41

Turning around, Jesus saw them following and asked, "What do you want?" They said, "Rabbi" (which means "Teacher"), "where are you staying?" "Come," he replied, "and you will see."

So they went and saw where he was staying, and they spent that day with him. It was about four in the afternoon.

Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, was one of the two who heard what John had said and who had followed Jesus. The first thing Andrew did was to find his brother Simon and tell him, "We have found the Messiah" (that is, the Christ).

Scripture Insights

In John 1, Andrew and Simon Peter are introduced to Jesus, the Lamb of God who would take away the sins of the world. Though both follow, they have not officially left their nets as seen in the other Gospels. After spending time with Jesus, Andrew hurries to find his brother, Simon Peter.

The first recorded question of Jesus to his disciples is found here in John 1:38 when he asks, "What are you seeking?" (NASB). Jesus's question is a great one for us today as well. People are driven by a wide variety of things—guilt, resentment, fear, stuff, and the need for approval, to name a few.

Jesus also makes this big statement as they share together: "Come and see." When we spend time with Jesus, we will find purpose and meaning in our lives—so much so that we will want to share it, just like Andrew did with Simon. We literally can't keep it to ourselves because it is not only *good* news but the *greatest news ever*.

God, help us to seek the right things, and help us to spend time with you on a daily basis so that we stay amazed by your love and are driven to share it with those around us.

The good guys came back, and audiences in theaters across the globe broke movie theater protocol by erupting in joyous applause. The buzz of that good news was unbridled and contagious.

I had a seminary professor who always translated the New Testament phrase "preaching the gospel" as "good news-ing." A good movie resolution does not hold a candle to the significance of the good news of Jesus. This good news rearranges hearts and transforms people.

No matter how gifted Paul's preaching was, he could not boast because the heart of his message was the sheer, audacious grace of a loving God who could make one into a whole new person. May this good news lodge itself so deep in us that we become compelled to join Paul in unbridled, contagious, and humble proclamation.

Scripture Insights

A relationship with Jesus is often associated with inner peace. After all, he promised us peace, and he is the Prince of Peace. In other words, more Jesus means less drama and a greater witness to a troubled world.

One day Jesus was teaching, and Pharisees and teachers of the law were sitting there. They had come from every village of Galilee and from Judea and Jerusalem. And the power of the Lord was with Jesus to heal the sick. Some men came carrying a paralyzed man on a mat and tried to take him into the house to lay him before Jesus. When they could not find a way to do this because of the crowd, they went up on the roof and lowered him on his mat through the tiles into the middle of the crowd, right in front of Jesus.

Scripture Insights

The story of the paralyzed man's friends in today's scripture is an excellent example of determined faith and its impact on overcoming physical and spiritual obstacles. Picture the scene: a wall-to-wall crowd in the house where Jesus is teaching. There are Pharisees, teachers of the law, and others from all over the region checking out the new teacher.

Entering from the center of the roof are the stars of our story: the paralyzed man and his friends. These are not fair-weather friends; they are real friends who help you get to Jesus. Because of their deep love and unwavering faith, they will not be deterred from bringing their friend to Jesus. No obstacle will stand in their way, so they don't *give* up when they discover the crowd. Instead, they get creative and *look* up. Climbing onto the roof with their friend in hand, they lower him, front and center, to Jesus.

They would not be stopped, and they went to the extreme. Jesus sees that kind of faith and rewards it. Not only did Jesus forgive their friend's sins (v. 20), but he also healed him of his paralysis (vv. 24–25), showcasing his divine authority and compassionate love.

Today's Prayer

Lord, thank you for the example of the paralyzed man's friends who demonstrated such unwavering faith and determination. Open our eyes to see the obstacles hindering the faith of those around us. May our actions draw them to you and demonstrate your love and power in their lives.

For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

Scripture Insights

I am currently enrolled in the Church and Community master's program at Trevecca Nazarene University. I often joke with people that I'm learning to be an *extra*-good Christian neighbor. We took a class on Wesleyan theology where we learned how John Wesley viewed salvation as the restoration of God's image in us. I love our Nazarene belief that we do not have to wait until eternity to experience the healing grace of God! We can have it here, "on earth as it is in heaven."

Today's scripture reminds me of this theology that we hold so dear. God has created you, dear friend, to do good works—right here, right now—and not because we need to earn a spot in heaven but because when the Holy Spirit fills our hearts, souls, and minds, we can't help but love others into a community full of people who are hungry for the Way of Jesus.

How can you extend to your neighbor a hospitality that demonstrates the good work of Jesus in and through you today?

What is the Spirit saving to you today?

Holy Spirit, show us where we need your healing grace to do the good works God has prepared for us. Help us create a community that invites the lonely, the lost, and our neighbors to find hope in Jesus, our Lord and Savior!

I know, it's weird. But since I only ran across new things every now and then, I learned that you can tell if something is truly new by the aroma it gives off, since looks can be deceiving.

Scripture Insights

In April 1995, I was working in Oklahoma City on the day the Alfred P. Murrah building was bombed. In an instant, a large office building was cratered on one side, and 168 souls lost their lives. The blast radius spread out for blocks, and the smoke rose quickly.

I was in my car, so I headed down to see how I might be able to help. I got there ten minutes after the bomb went off, and I wasn't allowed to get close. Looking through the fragments, I found what turned out to be the motor cylinder head and the transmission of the vehicle that was used to detonate the building, which had been flung far from the blast.

What struck me most was the fact that there may still be survivors under that rubble, under the weight of tons of debris. We must do something! I thought.

The whole city responded within hours, in hopes of finding signs of life. I saw that day a picture of what the church can and should be to a weary world caught under the weight of life.

What is the Spirit saving to you today?

Father, you have placed us here as heirs of a kingdom of light. May we never forget to do the work of digging out those trapped by life's darkness. Give us the grace to see those who just need a little more help.

"Stop grumbling among yourselves," Jesus answered. "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws them, and I will raise them up at the last day."

Scripture Insights

God is the Great Initiator, the First Actor in all of creation. Gaze at a mountain, consider the vast oceans, or peer into the face of a newborn. In all these, God has moved first, and we are stunned by his creative genius. God is also the Great Initiator in our redemption. God sent his Son, Jesus, long before we had any awareness of our deep need for him.

In today's scripture, the Jewish leaders are grumbling. Though they can be recipients of God's grace in the person of Jesus, they have refused to accept him. Their hearts have grown cold and unreceptive to the overtures of the Initiator.

We must guard against a similar mindset. God's grace always invites our response. The Creator God whose creation so humbles us made us with a soul vacancy only he can fill. Like the Jewish leaders who knew Jesus's parents and where he grew up, we must be careful not to let our proximity to and familiarity with Jesus become so commonplace that we fail to respond to his proposals.

Lord Jesus, you have searched us and know us. Overwhelm us today with a fresh awareness of your astonishing love, and move us by your Holy Spirit to respond to you with a consistent, "Yes, Lord! I'm yours! Use me as you see fit."

Scripture Insights

I'm sitting in the front room watching my nieces play with their new toys. On the other side, their mother is struggling through her final breaths in life as she fights the last days of her cancer. You might be familiar with this story. You've lost people to this tragic disease. She passes at the age of thirty-eight, leaving my brother and her two little girls behind. For months we prayed for healing, and now she's gone.

The question of why will linger for months, years, maybe even a lifetime. But God is teaching me. Sometimes we pray for God to heal a perceived need, but it's not the deepest need. I was praying for her cancer, but God was pursuing her heart.

The good news is only good if it changes the heart. You can be cancer free, but without Jesus you're still dying. You can see again, but without Jesus you're just blind. It's why Jesus in Matthew 9 forgives the paralytic before he asks him to walk. The real poverty of this world is people living without hope. The true work of faith is helping the poor receive the good news of Jesus—that's grace!

Lord, bring someone across our path who needs to know you. Give us the eyes to see them, the ears to listen to them, the arms to embrace them, and the heart to love them well.

Scripture Insights

In the verses leading up to this moment in today's scripture, Isaiah is full of holy fear. In a vision, Isaiah hears the seraphim worshiping and is wrecked by his smallness and sinfulness compared to the greatness and holiness of God.

Then—no doubt a reminder of a work God had already done in Isaiah—he sees a vision of a seraph coming to him with a burning coal. After touching it to Isaiah's lips, the seraph shares this beautiful imagery: "See, this has touched your lips. Now your guilt is removed, and your sins are forgiven" (v. 7, NLT).

After this profound vision, a reminder of God's extension of grace, Isaiah responds to God's question, "Who can I send?" with reckless gratitude and joyful abandon: SEND ME!

I wonder how God would ask us to respond to the radical grace we've been extended today. Worship? Obedience? Surrender? Boldness? Whatever God might be asking of us, Isaiah reminds us: how else can we respond to God's grace but with reckless gratitude and joyful abandon?

Almighty God, giver of good, extravagant grace, you have our reckless gratitude and joyful abandon today and every day. Show us your way!

They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them.

Scripture Insights

Jesus utters the words in John 20 on the evening of that first Easter, to foreshadow what will be fulfilled on the day of Pentecost in Acts 2.

Here, Jesus gives us our mission. Just as the Father sent Jesus to seek and save the lost, Jesus now says, "I am sending you."

The magnitude of the mission may cause us to clasp our hands in despair and cry out to the Lord, "Who is sufficient for the task?!" That is the disposition into which his power will come. The rivers run in the valleys. Our sense of unfitness for the mission prepares us to receive the breath of the Holy Spirit.

Just as God breathed into a lifeless Adam (Genesis 2:7), and just as Ezekiel called upon the Lord's breath to raise up dead bones into a vast army (Ezekiel 37:9–10), so the Holy Spirit will breathe into our lives this Pentecost to send us victoriously, powerfully on his mission to seek and save those who are lost!

Thank you for entrusting us with your mission. If you can raise dead bones into a vast army, we know you are able to raise the church to fulfill your mission to seek and save the lost.

Paul and those who partnered with him lived their lives in such a way that they reflected the nature of Jesus Christ. They were servant leaders, pouring themselves out for those to whom they ministered. This leadership did not come from any books they read or speakers who inspired but from their deep love for the people of Thessalonica.

The significance of this ministry reached far beyond teaching or preaching, to the ways in which they gave of themselves to help those within the community. The preceding verse says they treated the people like a nurse who tenderly cares for her own child.

As we think about sharing the gospel with those around us, we must remember that actions may just speak louder than our words. The world is watching to see whether we live our lives in such a way that the gospel has permeated every part of our being. This is only possible through a deep and abiding relationship of love with God and with our neighbor.

When you hear the word "prayer," what do you think about?

After Paul saw the vision, they left! So that's all I need, right? As soon as I grasp a grand, bold vision, I'll be ready to go, right? Because that's what a vision is—something so big that you can't do it unless God intervenes! Right?

No, but also yes.

What is the Spirit saving to you?

Paul received a vision of . . . one. A single man from Macedonia, crying out for help. Paul didn't see masses saved or cities come to repentance. Just one man—all it took was one.

The truth is that Paul couldn't have made a difference in the life of the one if it weren't for the power of God in his life. We know we don't have the power to move the masses, but we need to be equally aware that we alone do not have the ability to transform even *one* person. We need God for *all* of it. To make a difference in the life of one is a pretty big deal.

I love visiting Rome. Besides eating my weight in pasta and gelato, I love to see the many sites, like the Colosseum and the Pantheon, that still serve as reminders of the splendor of ancient Rome. Everything in Rome served as a reminder that Caesar was the lord and ruler of the world's most powerful empire.

In the ancient world, the word "gospel" meant an announcement that a ruler had conquered an enemy, reestablishing peace. This proclamation of peace was indeed always good news.

Paul too has good news to proclaim: the crucified and risen Jesus Christ is the ruler of the world! He is not just a messianic figure for the Jewish people but is now Lord of all creation. To stand in the most powerful city in the world and declare a carpenter from Nazareth to be the world's king seems utterly foolish. Yet Paul can proclaim that he is not ashamed to proclaim this good news.

Jesus is our peace. He alone, and not any of the other rulers throughout history, is the world's one Lord.

Today's Prayer

Almighty God, it still seems foolish in a world that is obsessed with power and wealth to declare that you alone are Lord of all. Give us the courage to proclaim in every city and to every person the good news that Jesus is Lord.
