She recalls the time when, as an 11-year-old girl, she stood sobbing on the doorstep of her home where, several hours earlier, her father had strangled her mother and then fired a 32-caliber bullet into his own head.

On that afternoon of April 19, 1963, she hugged her Chihuahua named Tiger as she watched the commotion in her front yard in Corpus Christi, Texas. Amid the flashing red and blue lights, a detective took notes, an officer by her side smoked a cigarette, a photographer clicked a camera, and onlookers flooded her yard. No one held her.

She eventually went on to graduate from Howard Payne University where she met and married a man who felt called into the ministry. Jenny and Sam have 3 married daughters and six grandchildren.

Jenny now speaks to groups across the nation. Her energetic, one-of-a-kind, storytelling style has captivated audiences around the nation for thirty years. She has spoken at the Southern Baptist Convention, the Texas Baptist Convention, Women’s Missionary Union conferences, and to churches and civic groups. She has shared the platform with speakers like Billy Graham and Jimmy Carter.

As we approach each new year, we often think of fresh starts, new chapters, new chances, and brand-new opportunities. It could be a time for a change, time to take action, or find new ways to serve. In that vein, Southern Nazarene is starting this year off with great news!

SNU has been awarded a U.S. Dept. of Education grant in the Strengthening Institutions Program. It's 5-year grant of approximately \$500,000 each year for a total of \$2,249,947. The money will be used by SNU to fulfill the Department of Education's stated goal of helping higher education institutions become self-sufficient and expand their capacity to serve low-income students.

SNU's Title III project is titled "Reaching the Marginalized Majority: Access and Success for Nontraditional Students." It requested funding for three initiatives:

- Building new professional studies curricular programs
- Developing student services for adult students
- Building an endowment for undergraduate scholarships.

The new programs include (a) a bachelor-level Cybersecurity degree, (b) taking the existing network management degree track to Tulsa, and (c) developing a new information system associate-level degree. The grant will also develop and pilot a new associate-level degree in Physical Therapy Assistant. The grant will fund faculty positions, renovated instructional labs and equipment, and library resources for these new programs. Student services will be expanded with an early alert system and career services geared toward adult learners.

SNU Connections by Howard Culbertson

Oklahoma boy who played football in Finland. Successful football coach at two Christian universities. Student recruiter. Sports Hall of Fame member.



That's Mike Redwine, current executive vice-president at Southern Nazarene University and our interviewee for the January SNU Connections time.

Redwine grew up in Chickasha, OK and says he has always considered SNU his school. However, when he graduated from high school, his love for football took him to Mid-America Nazarene University (SNU did not yet have an intercollegiate football team). He majored in mathematics and then started work on two master's degrees, one in education and the other an MBA.

At age 26, he was a graduate assistant for the MANU football team when that school named him head football coach. In 10 years he took the program from a no-win (0-111) season to an 11-2 season and the #5 position in the end-of-the-season NAIA poll.

At that point, he resigned as coach to become MANU's vice-president for enrollment management and then later vice-president for student development. He left MANU to become head football coach at Howard Payne University (Brownwood, TX) where he was named American Southwest Conference Coach of the Year in his first season.

After three seasons in Texas, he came to SNU to supervise transfer student recruitment. Now in his twelfth year at SNU, Dr. Redwine oversees student life, enrollment services, financial aid, athletics, spiritual life, campus housing, health services, and student employment.

He recently finished his doctorate (M.Ed.) at St. Louis University.

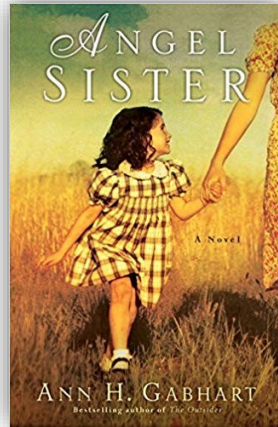

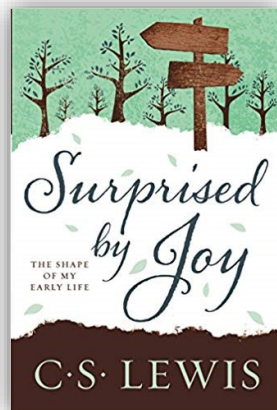

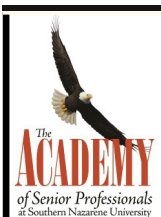
President Marla Mercer Cole is recovering from hand surgery. Please pray for her speedy recovery.
