





# Communications

At Trevecca, Communication majors have a wide variety of choices to fit their specific needs. Students can receive a Bachelor's Degree in five specialized majors: Dramatic Arts, Intercultural Communication, Interpersonal Communications and Human Relations, Mass Communications, and Speech.

As Dramatic Arts majors, students develop their skills in community, educational, and/or professional theatre. Intercultural Communication majors study how they can improve communication efforts and relationships with people from other cultures. Interpersonal Communication and

Human Relations majors study personal interaction and relationships. Mass Communication majors focus on applied journalism and television and radio broadcasting. Speech majors perfect their speaker-audience communication skills through theory and practice.

Students can also earn their Bachelor's Degree as a Communication Studies major. This major involves a combination of courses from the five specialized majors. A two-year Associate Degree is also offered in Broadcasting.



# Social

The Social and Behavioral Sciences Department has a lot to offer Trevecca students. They can major in History, History/Political Science, Social Science, Social Work, Behavioral Science and Psychology. Minors are offered in Behavioral Science, Sociology, Social Science, Social Work, Political Science, Psychology, and History. Two new areas of concentration being offered are Social Work and Pre-Law.

Through the Social Work program, the students learn to develop Christian values and ethics into their method of professional practice. As a Social Work major, the student not only focuses on study in Social Work, but in Sociology and Psychology as well.

In the program of Pre-Law, a personal program for each student planning to continue in graduate legal studies has been established. Although the program is commonly entered on political science and history, the student can minor in Business, English, and Communications.

As Psychology majors, stu-

dents are taught to understand human behavior with a Christian outlook. This is taught in accordance with substantial scientific psychology.

Behavioral Science majors are able to relate and understand people around them because of their strong research and education in the area of human behavior. Because of the emphasis that is placed by their professors upon the importance of comprehending human needs, students are able to develop responsible attitudes to the world around them.



# Management And

The Management and Human Relations degree completion program enables adults to finish their degree without interrupting their work schedule. Anyone that applies for this program must have sixty-two semester hours of college credit with at least a 2.0 GPA, and be twenty-five years of age. The program is a fifty-seven week schedule divided into ten five-week modules. The first module is Adult Development and Life Planning. Some of the other modules include Personal and Professional Values, Interpersonal Relations, Group and Organizational Behavior, Principles of Management, and Human Resources Management. Through the program, students can also receive credit

for life and career experiences such as raising a family or earning a CPR certificate. The completion of a Project Thesis is a special degree requirement for the Bachelor of Arts degree in MHR. Students design a project of their own interest that will benefit or improve their organization in some way, then work side-by-side with their employer to apply what they have developed. For the convenience of the students, MHR classes begin seven times a year and classes meet only one night a week. 



# Religion And

The Department of Religion and Philosophy offers majors in two areas. The Religion major provides a curriculum to prepare persons for various areas of Christian service as well as for graduate study in religion. The requirements for the Religion major, excluding the religious studies major, are designed to meet the ordination requirements specified by the Manual of the Church of the Nazarene. The Philosophy major serves to implement an education in the classical liberal arts tradition. The department serves the College in the General Education area by providing introductory courses in Bible, doctrine, and philosophy, as well as senior seminars designed to integrate faith, learning, and liv-







In the spring semester of the 1992-1993 school-year, Trevecca entered a contest with Belmont University. Each school was racing to discover who could bring in the most pheresis donors in the month of March.

The American Red Cross Pheresis Program is one in which volunteers donate platelets and other blood products for leukemia, cancer, transplant, aplastic anemia, and other seriously ill patients whose bodies are no longer capable of producing these much-needed blood products on their own.

Platelets are the component of the blood that produce clotting and are known to offset some of the complications that arise from chemotherapy. Platelets from donors are injected into the bodies of patients until their bodies are again capable of producing them.

Trevecca once again proved her willingness to serve. Despite the somewhat frightful two-hour process in which three-fourths of the blood in the donor's body is circulated from one arm, through a machine which removes the platelets, and then back into the donor's other arm, Trevecca students participated and even won the contest. qua, Barbara McClain, and Annie Stevens.













# 1993 Darda Dedication







After suffering through seasons of 1991 and 1992, the Trevecca baseball Trojans have resurfaced to a position of respect in NAIA District 24 and the TCAC. During the previous two seasons, the Trojans only managed a total of 20 wins. But 1993 was to be different. The team finished with a 27-21 record and qualified for the eight team NAIA District 24 Tournament by finishing fourth in the TCAC. At the tournament, the Trojans won two and lost two to finish fourth in the District.

Several players contributed to the successful turn-around this season. The team was led offensively by MVP Roger Brown, a hard-hitting, slick fielding sophomore third baseman from Canada who pounded out 16 home runs and had 51 RBI'S, and hitting .345. # Nashville, Tennessee

Volume number 69 of the 1993 Trevecca Nazarene College Darda, was printed by the Josten's Printing and Publishing Company located in Clarksville, Tennessee. A total of 650 books were printed at a total cost of over \$21,000. The cost of the book to students is covered in the general fee which the student pays at the beginning of each semester. Each student is entitled to a book if they have attended for both the Fall and Spring semesters consecutively. If a student has attended for only one semester the cost of the book is \$10 while the cost to the faculty and staff is \$15.

This 9x12 book features a firebrand vinyl embossed cover with gold foil stamping. Parchment endsheets with a maroon stamp opened and closed the book.

The thematic statement "Charting the Course" was carried out on the division pages and the folio tabs. The length of the publication is 208 pages. The book contains 24 color pages and 8 pages of spot color.

The typeface used as Benguiat Book. The picture captions were set in 8 point Benguiat, and the body copy was set in 10 point Benguiat. Most headlines were set in 60 point Benguiat.

Michael's Photography out of Smyrna, Tennessee shot all the faculty, staff, senior, and underclass portraits. The staff appreciates the hard work of Michael, Chris, and all the others at the studio.

The Josten's representatives Kelly Jackson and Harold McGehee have worked very close with the staff from the book's inception. Kelly's advice and insights helped tremendously with the development and the completion of this book. Harold was faithful and patient from beginning to end.
