Dr. Thelma B. Culver To Be Listed In Next Publication of Who's Who

Dr. Thelma B. Culver, Dean of the College, has been notified of her selection to Who's Who in America by the A. W. Marquis Company of Chi-

Listings in Who's Who in America are "selected solely on the basis of the editor's estimate of actual or probable reference interest, sufficiently widespread to be more than merely sectional and resulting from meritorious achievement."

Dr. Culver received her Master's degree in Education at the University of Washington and her Doctorate at the University of Colorado. Sincè 1946, she has been Dean of the College. The biography will appear in the Twenty-Eighth Edition of Who's Who in America.

Here in the Northwest, Dr. Culver has been appointed to serve on a committee for the selection of a Kellogg study topic. The appointment came from Alton Jones, State Superintendent of Schools.

The committee is a planning group to develop a topic study under the regional program to prove school administration in the Pacific Northwest and is aided by the W. K. Kellogg company.

Dr. Culver has also been notified by J. D. Buchanan, president of the University of Idaho, of her appointment by the State Board of Education and Board of Regents of the University to serve on a State Advisory Committee on Teacher Edu-

The ADPs were closest to them with 1,341 points, followed by the Olys with 1,224 and the LSPs with 1,080.

The ADPs tied the SLAs for the first in Shakespearean Dialogue and took first place in the Jamboree and in participation points to cop second place in the literary field. The Oly literary points from the contest program enabled them to edge past the LSPs in the final

First place honors in girls basketball, boys' softball, boys' ping pong, and second places in football, boys' basketball, volleyball, girls' softball, and participation points enabled the ADPs to edge past the SLAs in athletic points with 2,1301/2. The leading SLAs took participation points for a total of 1,922 points for second place. The Olys with firsts in football, boys' softball (tie), boys' tennis singles and doubles, boys' golf, and horseshoes had a third place total of 1,6951/2 points for a scant 33-point margin over the LSPs. The LSP girls took firsts in tennis singles, softball and ping pong and seconds in basketball and tennis doubles to capture an important part of their 1,662 athletic points.

Most participation points went to the ADPs for the third straight semester with a total for both athletic and literary of 514. Second were the SLAs with 497 points followed by the LSPs with 467 and the Olys with only 197.

Always interested in the work of missions, they volunteered for missionary service and in March, 1946, sailed for the Cape Verde islands. Our clubs should keep "service" as their motto only we should change it to, "Service to Others," instead of "Service to Us." Why can't we have club projects to hold the interest of the members and to perpetuate the club name. As it is, interest is dwindling to the point where we are in danger of finding some of our clubs fading into complete oblivion.

Stop Reading NOW

For instance a few years ago one of the clubs undertook the project of securing and placing the metal wastebaskets which we see the remains of at several strategic places. The baskets are now an eyesore on the campus because no one took charge of their maintenance. A club should take pride in their service projects—enough pride to keep them in repair. The publicity they get and the good will they build will go a long way toward making it an honor to hold membership and the duties fulfilled by the members will make them feel a definite obligation to a co-operative organization.




