SNU's Academy of Senior Professionals is breaking new ground by beginning the year with a September luncheon meeting rather than an October one.

Our luncheon speaker at that September 10 meeting in the SNU Commons will be Lee Roland, who is currently pastor of The Parish church in the Plaza District. He has been recommended to us because of his 12 years as principal of Tulakes Elementary, a neighborhood school two miles north of Southern Naz-



arene University. Roland is credited with turning around that failing school. Suspension rates were drastically lowered while test scores and retention rates rose.

Empathy towards students and parents was a consistent theme of Roland's school leadership. He talks and writes about working to get his mostly white staff to gain a better understanding of their mostly nonwhite families.

"Over time, the weather of life violently ripped every leaf of hope, happiness, and faith from their branches," wrote Roland, describing many of the families he served at Tulakes. "Over time, all the soil of righteousness, justice and pride was eroded from their roots and trunks. What was left barely standing was a leafless and barren tree, just tired of being tired."

Roland also wrote about his effort to help teachers understand that while they may have grown up with a positive perception of school, many of their students' parents had the opposite experience.

"As children, [those teachers] flourished academically. They were teacher favorites and only visited the principal's office for praise and reward. Hence, school was a place they eagerly returned to in adulthood," Roland wrote. "For many of the parents these teachers are now serving, their experiences were polar opposites."



SNU Connections bv Howard Culbertson

Our look at the doctoral studies of SNU professors during the "SNU Connections" moments at the monthly ASP luncheons will continue this year. At the September 10 meeting, we'll hear from Dr. Melany Kyzer who is SNU's Provost and Chief Academic Officer.



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Dr. Kyzer has been a member of the SNU campus community for more than three and a half decades. She came to campus first as a student and, not long after graduation with a Bachelor of Science in Biol-

ogy Education, she began working in the office of Student Development.

Over the next dozen or so years, she filled numerous roles. Those included the Director of Housing, Director of Academic Services, Director of Community Life and Resident Director. Early in that period of time, she earned a Master of Arts in Communication Education from SNU.

About 10 years after getting that master's degree, Dr. Kyzer moved from Student Development into a faculty role when she began teaching courses in the Speech Communication Department. For a while, she served as Executive Director of the Oklahoma Speech Theatre & Communication Association. In 2008, she graduated from Oklahoma City University with a Juris Doctor degree. She passed her bar exams and, to this day, maintains membership in the Oklahoma Bar Association

In 2011, Melany Kyzer was named as the Dean of SNU's College of Humanities. Then, in 2013, she became the university's Chief Academic Officer and in 2016 was named as SNU Provost.

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
Book *Discussion* by Barbara Culbertson
